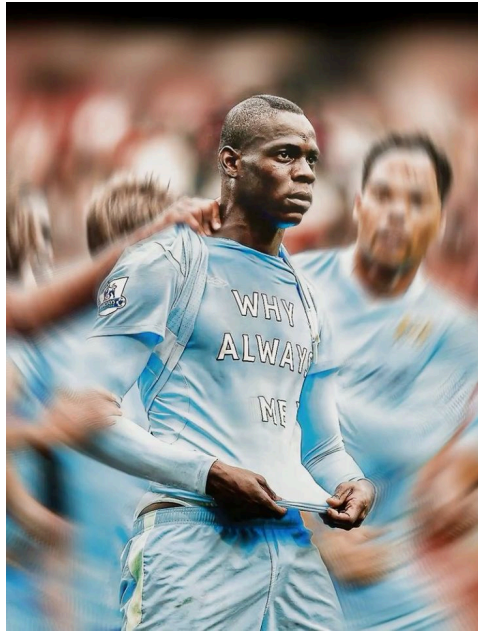


My 5 favorite athletes of all time

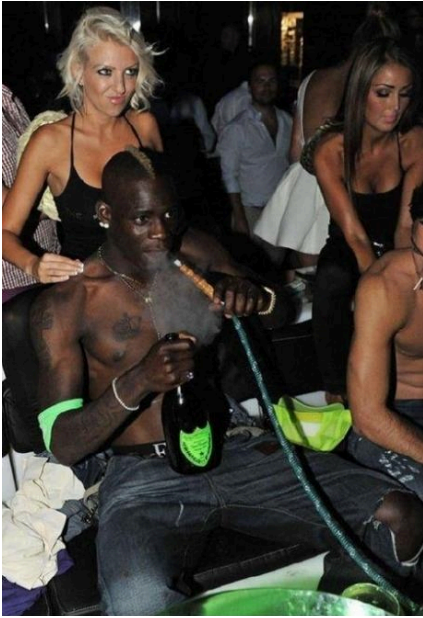
2. Nick Kyrgios
